Dear Friends in Christ,

A mother was preparing pancakes for her sons, Kevin, 5, and Ryan, 3. The boys began to argue over who would get the first pancake. Their mother saw the opportunity for a moral lesson. She turned to face them and said, "If Jesus were sitting here, He would say, 'Let my brother have the first pancake. I can wait.'" Kevin turned to his younger brother and said, 'Ryan, you be Jesus.'

Waiting. It isn't easy, especially when we are waiting on God. Scripture is filled with the stories of men and women who experienced agonizing periods of waiting on the Lord. Abram and Sarai waited 25 years for God to fulfill His promise that someday they would have a child. When Isaac was born, they were old enough to be greatgrandparents! The Israelites suffered for more than 400 years in Egyptian slavery, waiting for God to deliver them. After Samuel had anointed him king of Israel, David waited years to assume the throne that was rightfully his. For three long days Jesus' followers waited for hope to break through their darkest despair as His battered body lay in the tomb.

Jesus did rise from the dead and returned to His Father in Heaven to prepare a home for us, and we who call Him Savior and Lord have been waiting more than two thousand years for Him to return.

The difficult work of waiting is a part of our relationship with God. There is no doubt that His timing is different than ours. The apostle Peter writes, "Do not forget this one thing, dear friends: With the Lord a day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like a day." (2 Peter 3:8)

As we wait through the cold of winter for the sun-warmed breath of Spring, as we wait through the solemn time of Lent for the joy of Easter, as we wait through the troubles and trials of our lives for God's answer to our prayers, it can seem as if God has forgotten us, or even as if God is not there at all. But we are not discouraged. We continue to remember the love of God who has already called you to be His own and promises to always be with you. Join the psalmist who writes, "I will wait for You; You will answer, Lord my God." Psalm 38:15. Or again, "We wait in hope for the Lord; He is our help and our shield." Psalm 33:20

Lent and Easter remind us that our waiting is not in vain, God has not forgotten us. God, through His grace in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, has redeemed you, reclaimed you as His own, and created a new life in you by the Holy Spirit. Join us as we wait on the Lord during our Wednesday Lenten services and our Holy Week services. Most of all, join us on Easter Sunday, April 20th, when the Resurrection reminds us that we do not have to wait for God at all...He is already among us.

Thank you for your gift that you sent me back in December in support of my studies at the seminary. Lake Oconee Lutheran Church Council Meeting March 9, 2025

The meeting was called to order by President Mike Joost who led us in prayer.

Kayleen Ringer was absent, and all other members were in attendance.

The minutes from the February 9, 2025, council meeting was approved.

Council Committee Reports:

VP/Personnel: Pam Kunz – Pam announced Margaret Pedersen has accepted the nomination to fill the Christian Education position for the balance of this year.

Treasurer: Kathie Kueven – Kathie reviewed the February Treasurer's Report. The monthly giving for February was down \$21,034 to budget with a year-to-date difference of \$17,278. Expenses were below budget in the amount of \$17,495 with a year-to-date difference of \$16,241. The Bread of Life Food Pantry is doing very well with a bank balance of \$107,629 and a CD balance of \$157,041. For perspective, Davis originally donated \$150,000 to start the food pantry and we put \$50,000 into a checking and \$100,000 into a savings account. The CD is now worth \$157,000 and the bank balance is at \$107,000 after all of the expenses.

Mike announced that the Bread of Life is now accepted into the Golden Harvest program which means we can purchase food at greatly reduced prices. They will deliver what we order. We also have access to free produce as part of the program. The program will start sometime after training at the end of the month.

Financial Secretary: Walter Krause - The financial report for February was distributed and discussed. Walter noted that donations for February show a decrease of \$6,324 and a year-to-date decrease of \$31,029. He is not exactly sure what accounts for the decrease but speculates that several higher dollar donors have passed away. We also have a few donors who did not make their donations in February and perhaps we will see something in March.

Congregation Secretary: Carol Campbell – None.

Christian Education: Vacant – Mark discussed perhaps starting a vacation bible school in the summer to perhaps draw in other children from the community. We could hold it in the community center perhaps for a day rather than a whole week. Mike mentioned that they had started clearing the road for the new subdivision behind the church. That could be an avenue to bring in new members and perhaps children to attend a bible school.

Church Properties: Mark Dentler – Mark was pleased with the work the Church Properties working group accomplished on March 1. The tasks that were completed were:

- Approximately 175 bales of pine straw laid around the Church (Cost \$700)
- 3 folding tables repaired
- All chairs in sanctuary repaired and screws tightened
- · Florescent light fixture lenses cleaned
- All weeds around Church sprayed with Roundup

- Sprinkler system inspected ... leak found near bridge and will be repaired this month.
 The indoor controller was found to be defective and needs to be replaced. The only
 areas that potentially need water (if flowers are planted) is the front of the Church
 around the cross and possibly the Memorial area
- Refrigerator inspected by a contractor and found to need a part. Part has been ordered.
 The contractor suggested an annual maintenance agreement, and this will be considered once quote is received.

The working group also did an inspection and came up with a list of items in the church that need to be addressed:

- Several ceiling tiles have water spots/damage and need to be replaced
- Sink cabinet doors in nursery need adjustment
- · Sheetrock in Beth's office needs repair
- Dishwasher needs to be replaced not working properly
- Storage room needs reorganizing cleaning
- · Cracks in tiles in kitchen and men's bathroom
- Kick-plate under kitchen counter needs to be re-attached
- Intake vents need cleaning in kitchen
- Various carpet stains
- Some mold on gutters and repairs needed
- The playground needs to be removed ... current equipment unsafe and in poor condition
- Picnic tables / benches need repair and maintenance
- Fountain in Memorial area needs repair / maintenance
- Drain culvert has shifted about 2-3 inches and should be looked at by qualified technicians perhaps from the county

Mike Joost shared that we do not need a new dishwasher, but an individual heater for the commercial grade dishwasher that will bring the temperature of the water up to the correct level. The cost of that heater could be around \$2,000. He also offered to provide a less expensive contractor to replace the defective controller. The pine straw cost \$700 and Mark submitted an invoice for reimbursement. Mike also shared that the side doorbell had been repaired.

Mark said they plan to replace the ceiling lights with LED lights in the fixtures outside the sanctuary that have not yet been converted. Mark also mentioned that the south side of the church sign was not operational. He is looking at a few solutions to either repair it, shut it off or perhaps put a banner over it. He will continue to explore options.

Lay Ministry: Don Menke – The Elders' list has been updated and is now posted. We have a parishioner who is allergic to lilies. Margaret called her this morning and left a message on her voice mail to warn her that we could have lilies at our Easter service. Margaret will contact Deer Run to ask them not to include lilies in any of the arrangements they prepare for the church. Kathie informed us that Lance Pailor was put on hospice care.

Christian Service/Outreach: Kayleen Ringer – Absent. Margaret shared that we were currently collecting Easter baskets and that the deadline for collection was March 23. Pam shared that the blood drive on March 6 was a huge success. Our goal was 36 and we collected 44 donations.

Old Business:

Milledgeville – Kathie shared that we have received pricing for the remodeling of the building and Dave Ringer is currently going over the numbers. Pam mentioned that she was speaking with Pastor Ochner who indicated that he might be interested in coming back into the ministry from retirement on a part time basis. Pam thought he could be a potential called worker for the Milledgeville position. He lives in Augusta, but might be willing to commute part time. Mike also said we need to be sure that we have a called person there so that we don't lose our church property status if it is viewed as a medical center rather part of the ministry. Margaret brought up perhaps adding prayers for the Milledgeville ministry each Sunday.

New Business:

Christian Education Position – A motion to approve Margaret Pedersen as the head of Christian Education for the balance of the year was made and approved.

Carol Dunn Estate – We were contacted two weeks ago that Carol Dunn's estate left the church some stock in her will. The church does not maintain an investment portfolio. The estate would have to pay taxes if they liquidated the stock and provided the proceeds to the church. Instead, they can gift the stock to a church securities account, we would sell the stock and place the proceeds in the brokerage account. Carol will prepare a resolution authorizing Kathie Kueven and Mike Joost to set up such an account. A motion was made to set up the securities account to accept the donated securities so we can liquidate them, but we will want to maintain that account going forward. The motion was approved.

The meeting was adjourned followed by the Lord's Prayer.

Opportunities to Serve

Lake Oconee Lutheran Church Food Ministry

The goal of The Bread of Life Food Pantry and the Little Free Pantry is to respond to the needs of our community through food distribution and support by sharing God's love in Word and action with those most in need.

We do this in two separate ways:

- 1. <u>The Bread of Life Food Pantry</u> provides equitable access to food and staples twice per month to those in need in the community.
- 2. <u>The Little Free Pantry provides emergency food for community members who</u> might have run out of food and have no other means in which to feed themselves or their family.

We also have two different mechanisms by which LOLC members can provide either their time or their donations to help us sustain both important ministries.

- For the Bread of Life Food Pantry cash donations are the best way to support
 this ministry. We need a certain number of specific items for each distribution
 and limited storage. You can volunteer your time on the second and fourth
 Wednesday and Thursdays of the month to either set up the food distribution
 or distribute the food to those in need.
- For the Little Free Pantry, food and/or cash donations are needed. The food you
 provide goes directly into the pantry and any cash you provide is used to fill in
 supplies where we might be running short. You can volunteer your time by
 checking on the cabinet and filling it up when food supplies run low.

Volunteers may sign up for either or both pantries by signing the sheets provided on the blue table in the narthex.

Because the Little Free Pantry is to be used to fill in what is needed on an emergency basis, we thought it would be helpful to provide a shopping list for those who choose to donate food and a daily distribution list for those who fill up the Little Free Pantry. You will find a handy guide to help you with these important tasks posted on the doors where we keep the Pantry food. Please limit food donations to the items on this list. It can help you when you shop for the pantry or when you fill the pantry with supplies. As always, we thank you so much for the wondrous gifts you provide for both important ministries.
