Dear Friends,

"Have you seen my new tattoo?" Tattoos are popular today. Sports figures and movie stars show them off. They are the subject of television shows and magazine articles. Men, women, young, old...at times it seems as if everyone wears some kind of body marking.

In ancient times, there was another type of body marking. Many pagan temples had slaves attached to them. To indicate their lifelong attachment to the temple which owned them, these slaves were physically branded with the name of the particular god or goddess whom they served. Therefore, a lifelong slave at the temple of Diana would bear the mark of Diana in his flesh, and no matter where he might be seen, he would always be recognized as a slave of Diana's temple.

Writing to people who knew this reality, the apostle Paul, who frequently referred to himself as a slave of Christ, writes "I bear in my body the marks of the Lord Jesus" (Galatians 6:17). We are not completely sure what marks Paul is referring to in this way. Most likely they were the scars; perhaps from the

whippings that he received at the hands of the Jews, or perhaps from the stones which were thrown at him in Lystra, or even by the rods with which he was beaten at Philippi. At any rate, Paul was a “marked man” and he was proud to wear on his body these marks which were evidence of his relationship with his Lord.

We too are called to be marked men or women. We too are marked as one of the slaves of Christ. Marked, not on the outside by something as simple and external as a tattoo or past scars but marked by our God at our Baptism. Receiving the sign of the cross upon our foreheads and upon our hearts, we are marked as ones who are redeemed by Christ the crucified. And that marking by God through the Holy Spirit shows itself in our lives. It shows itself in our attitude, in our speech, in our habits, in fact all our behavior reveals us as marked people—followers of Christ. No matter where you go, God wants you to bear on your body (your entire view of life and living) the marks that show you to be a follower of Christ.

How have we been bearing that mark? Have we been ashamed of it? Have we tried to conceal it? Or have we proudly displayed it as a badge of honor? Have we been proud to wear the marks which are evidence of our relationship with our Lord? Have we been as willing to show the mark of God in our lives as others have been willing to show a new tattoo? May we always be ready to confess: “I bear in my body the marks of the Lord Jesus.”

Opportunities to Serve

Lake Oconee Lutheran Church Food Ministry

The goal of The Bread of Life Food Pantry and the Little Free Pantry is to respond to the needs of our community through food distribution and support by sharing God's love in Word and action with those most in need.

We do this in two separate ways:

1. The Bread of Life Food Pantry provides equitable access to food and staples twice per month to those in need in the community.
2. The Little Free Pantry provides emergency food for community members who might have run out of food and have no other means in which to feed themselves or their family.

We also have two different mechanisms by which LOLC members can provide either their time or their donations to help us sustain both important ministries.

- For the Bread of Life Food Pantry cash donations are the best way to support this ministry. We need a certain number of specific items for each distribution and limited storage. You can volunteer your time on the second and fourth Wednesday and Thursdays of the month to either set up the food distribution or distribute the food to those in need.
- For the Little Free Pantry, food and/or cash donations are needed. The food you provide goes directly into the pantry and any cash you provide is used to fill in supplies where we might be running short. You can volunteer your time by checking on the cabinet and filling it up when food supplies run low.

Volunteers may sign up for either or both pantries by signing the sheets provided on the blue table in the narthex.

Because the Little Free Pantry is to be used to fill in what is needed on an emergency basis, we thought it would be helpful to provide a shopping list for those who choose to donate food and a daily distribution list for those who fill up the Little Free Pantry. You will find a handy guide to help you with these important tasks posted on the doors where we keep the Pantry food. Please limit food donations to the items on this list. It can help you when you shop for the pantry or when you fill the pantry with supplies. As always, we thank you so much for the wondrous gifts you provide for both important ministries.

**Council Meeting
September 21, 2025**

The meeting was called to order by Vice President Pam Kunz. Pastor Steve led us in prayer.

Mike Joost was absent, and all other members were in attendance.

The minutes from the August 10, 2025, council meeting were approved.

Council Committee Reports:

VP/Personnel: Pam Kunz – No report.

Treasurer: Kathie Kueven – The August Treasurer's Report was reviewed. As Kathie was on vacation, the report covers August 1 through August 30 so the August 31st offering was not included in income. The August 31 collections will be included in the September report. Year-to-date offerings to budget were down \$36,199 and year-to-date expenses to budget were down \$20,264. The community center activity is running close to last year. The rentals cover the expenses of the center. At some point, we will stop renting the center full time and most likely use it for the Bread of Life ministry full-time. The details of that transition will be discussed when a more definitive plan is in place.

Financial Secretary: Walter Krause – The financial report for August was distributed and discussed. The report covered August 1 through August 30 so it would align with the Treasurer's report. August of 2024 had four Sundays as well. Donations were down \$24,360 year-to-date compared to last year.

Congregation Secretary: Carol Campbell – No report.

Christian Education: Margaret Pedersen – No report.

Church Properties: Mark Dentler – Last weekend a group of parishioners cleaned out all the weeds around the cross at the front of the church. Terry Pedersen looked at the lights for outages and Mike Joost has ordered LED bulbs so we will start converting the lights over to LED in the offices and hallways. The leak in the air conditioning at the community center has been repaired. We had a crew pressure washing the porte cochere and in the process they damaged some of the ceiling tiles as they were made from sheet rock. Mark is going to repair and paint them, but at some point we will need to replace the ceiling tiles with materials that are more maintenance friendly. We will pressure wash the second story as well. The windows will be cleaned. Mark will schedule a workday on October 4 for Milledgeville clean out. We received a bill of \$3,175 from Grimes Plumbing for repair of the water leak at the church. Mark will talk to Piedmont as the break was on the other side of the meter, and the church should not be responsible for paying it.

Lay Ministry: Don Menke – The Elders did meet in August and finalized the salaries for the budget.

Christian Service/Outreach: Kayleen Ringer – The school supply drive went well. We collected 1,261 items half will go to Greene County and the other half to Putnam County. They will place the supplies in a closet where they can be accessed based on need.

We have eleven boxes collected for Operation Christmas Child and we need to remind parishioners the deadline to collect boxes is fast approaching. We do have over \$5,000 in the budget to spend on building additional boxes if needed. The due date is mid-November. The boxes cost \$30 per box online this year as opposed to \$25 last year.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Hayden – Pastor is attending the Pastor's conference Sept. 22-24. The set up and tear down for Upscale Resale was announced in church. The voter's meeting is scheduled for Sunday, September 28, to authorize the church to sign the lease with Oconee Valley Health Care. Oconee Valley Health Care will then meet to approve their signing of the lease. Once that is done, Oconee Valley will work out the financing and construction. The longterm plan next spring will be to organize a call committee to find a church worker. Pastor would like to schedule an afternoon for a blessing at Milledgeville before reconstruction starts and we will invite the congregation, Oconee Valley Health Care, the Milledgeville mayor and the commissioner.

The church secretary's probation period is over and she is doing a wonderful job. We increased her salary \$1.00 per hour and will be eligible for another raise on her work anniversary.

Our website needs to be updated. Pastor asked the council to make a list of what needs to be updated so the website can be changed.

Hope Clear Out Date – October 4 is the clear out date.

Carol Dunn Estate – We are still waiting for Carol Dunn's estate to be probated. We have a new account set up to receive equities from the parishioners. The broker is willing to talk to the parishioners about the process for donating equities and Pastor will ask Mike Joost to follow up with him on a potential date for that presentation.

LOLC 25th Anniversary – Pam is going to put an item in the bulletin about the anniversary asking anyone who has photographs to provide them so Pam can scan them and work on a video for the event.

Worn Communion Kneeler Cushions – Mike Joost has repaired the cushions that had worn buttons.

New Business:

Status of Candidates for LOLC Office – Pam will talk with Margaret Pedersen to see if she would be willing to fill a new term for head of Christian Education.


Date for Congregational Voter's Meeting – We will hold a November meeting to approve the budget. It was decided to hold the meeting on November 16.

Hope Draft Lease – Pastor made the lease available to the congregation to read. It is a 20-year lease. Oconee Valley pays us \$1.00 per year for 20 years. Oconee Valley will take out the mortgage for construction to remodel the entire structure and they will also be adding some more square footage. They will pay all the upkeep/maintenance on the entire property. We have a 100% remodeled space for our use for no annual cost to us. Our responsibility will be to call a church worker and pay for their costs and any additional programming. The Milledgeville property will be collateral for the loan; however, the additional acreage that surrounds the property belongs to Lake Oconee Lutheran and is not part of the collateral. After 20 years, Oconee Valley does have the option to renew the lease for another ten years. The Synod has already approved the project; however, Pastor will be providing them with an update on the project. Pastor will be presenting the lease to the congregation and Dr. Ringer will be there to answer any questions for Lake Oconee Health Care. There will be another congregational meeting called to approve the addition of the church worker.

A motion was made, seconded and approved to present the lease to the voter's meeting on Sunday, September 28.

Budget – Kathy distributed the 2026 budget. Expenses will increase by \$11,754 from 2025 which is made up primarily of salaries. Income will increase by the same amount. We did not reduce the district tithe as it is still 10% of actual receipts. The Pastor was excused so the council could discuss the budgeted salaries. In the past, the Elders approved an across-the-board increase of 5% for Pastor and all church workers. This year since our offerings have been decreasing, the Elder's approved a 3% increase for the Pastor, the music director, pianist and janitorial services. They approved an additional 2% increase for Pastor the back half of the year if income meets the budgeted amount. There was a discussion about the rationale for the lower increases. The council recommended that the Elders ask for salary information from the district so in the future we can compare market data with current salaries. There was discussion about an increase for Sonya for the janitorial services she provides. The council recommended that we obtain a job description for these services so we could compare the cost of providing them in-house vs. outsourced. Mark is going to spearhead that effort. Pam is going to speak with Sonya about her current duties so we could update any job description we might have. Kathie will need to correct the music director's salary as the budgeted amount does not reflect the 3% increase. There was also a question as to whether we should budget more money for a guest organist, but at this point it is not clear when one would be needed and the cost of obtaining that individual. The meeting was adjourned followed by the Lord's Prayer.
